FROM THE VICARAGE



On 6 February 2022, the 70th anniversary of her accession, Her Majesty the Queen became the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee. The celebration of the Jubilee is being marked by church services, the Trooping of the Colour, concerts, the lighting of beacons, and other events.

As well as celebrating her work and service as our Monarch and Head of our nation, the Church of England celebrates the 70th Anniversary of Her Majesty's leadership as Head of the Church of England, Defender of the Faith and our Supreme Governor

Throughout her reign the Queen has been an inspirational leader of Christ's Church. Committed to daily private prayer and public worship each Sunday, Her Majesty's faith underpins her whole life. Her speeches and addresses typically speak of God, the Church and her faith. The Queen's Christmas Day Commonwealth speeches are among the few she writes herself, often drawing on Our Lord's parable and applying these to today's world. Even now, in her 96th year, she exemplifies Christ's model of servant leadership and works tirelessly in the service of God and her fellow humanity.

Underpinning her reign as Head of both the Church and our Nation has been the Queen's recognition that she cannot do this alone; she relies on the prayers of her subjects:

I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service... But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do: I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it.

Princess Elizabeth, 21 April 1947

When I spoke to you last... I asked you all, whatever your religion, to pray for me on the day of my Coronation - to pray that God would give me wisdom and strength to carry out the promises that I should then be making... I have been uplifted and sustained by the knowledge that your thoughts and prayers were with me.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE QUEEN'S CORONATION

Queen Elizabeth II was crowned on 2 June, 1953 in Westminster Abbey. Her Majesty was the thirty-ninth Sovereign to be crowned at Westminster Abbey.

Queen Elizabeth II is the sixth Queen to have been crowned in Westminster Abbey in her own right. The first was Queen Mary I, who was crowned on 1 October, 1553.

The Queen succeeded to the Throne on the 6 February, 1952 on the death of her father, King George VI. She was in Kenya at the time and became the first Sovereign in over 200 years to accede while abroad.

The Queen's grandmother, Queen Mary, aged 81 was the first Queen to see a grandchild ascend to the throne. However, she died before the Coronation took place.

The Coronation service used for Queen Elizabeth II descends directly from that of King Edgar at Bath in 973. The original 14th century order of service was written in Latin and was used until the Coronation of Elizabeth I.

The Coronation Bouquet was made up of white flowers comprising of orchids and lilies-of-the-valley from England, stephanotis from Scotland, orchids from Wales, and carnations from Northern Ireland and the Isle of Man.

The Queen's Coronation service began at 11.15am and lasted The Imperial State Crown, which was worn by The Queen almost three hours.

The Archbishop of Canterbury conducted the service, a duty which has been undertaken since the Conquest in 1066. For the first time in 1953, a representative of another Church, the Moderator of the Church of Scotland, also took part.

Westminster Abbey has been the setting for every Coronation The Coronation service fell into six parts: the recognition, the oath, the anointing, the investiture (which includes the

> The recipe for the Anointing Oil contains oils of orange, roses, cinnamon, musk and ambergris. Usually a batch is made to last a few Coronations, but in May 1941 a bomb hit the Deanery destroying the phial, so a new batch was made.

> During the investiture, The Queen first put on the newly-made Colobium Sindonis - a loose linen-lawn garment, and then a robe of cloth of gold called the Dalmatic or Supertunica. The Lord Great Chamberlain presented the golden spurs, the symbol of chivalry, after which the Archbishop of Canterbury presented a jewelled sword, and then the armills, the golden bracelets of sincerity and wisdom. Finally, The Queen put on stole and cloth of gold Robe Royal and received the orb, the coronation ring, the glove, and then the sceptre.

> The Queen was crowned in St Edward's Chair, made in 1300 for Edward I and used at every Coronation since that time. It is permanently kept in Westminster Abbey.

> The Queen appeared with her family on the balcony of Buckingham Palace still wearing the Imperial State Crown and the Royal Robes to greet the cheering crowds. Her Majesty appeared again on the balcony at 9.45 pm to turn on the 'lights of London'. Lights cascaded down the Mall, lighting the huge cipher on Admiralty Arch and turning the fountains in Trafalgar Square into liquid silver, until all the floodlights from the National Gallery to the Tower of London had been illuminated.

> during her return to Buckingham Palace, contained four pearls traditionally believed to have been Queen Elizabeth I's earrings.

But things will come to settle down. It's life, when Mistress wears a crown; Yes, it will pass, you all will see This business of the Jubilee.


So, we shall wag our doggy tails! Be happy, like the Prince of Wales! We think the Boss has done just fine Being Queen for all this time!

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


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NADIYA'S CORONATION AUBERGINE

Serves 4-6



Aubergines often feature as a side dish when served at a table for dinner, but not here. We are taking this delicious aubergine, coating it with flavour, frying till tender and then drizzling over the simplest coronation dressing. It's like dinner at my mum's collided with my lunches at school to create this beauty.

(222)

Ingredients

For the aubergine

- 225ml olive oil
- 3 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 small onion, grated
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 large aubergines, sliced into 1cm thick slices (about 600g)

For the dressing

- 200g Greek yoghurt
- 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons mango chutney, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons whole milk

- a small handful of crispy
- a small handful of raisins
- a small handful of fresh coriander, thinly sliced



- 1 Start by putting the oil in a bowl with the minced garlic, onion, paprika and salt. Mix really well and set aside with a pastry brush.
- 2 Pop the aubergines onto a tray (they can overlap, that is fine). Take the oil mixture and brush the aubergine slices generously with the oil on both sides till you have finished all the mixture. Set aside.
- 3 Put one large or two small (if you have them) griddle pan(s) onto a medium heat (these are great on the barbecue, too, FYI).
- 4 Griddle in batches on both sides. They take approx. 2 minutes on each side. You will know they are ready when the flesh looks saturated, less spongy and softer. Pop onto a plate, overlapping, ready to serve.
- 5 Make the dressing by combining the yoghurt, curry powder, garlic, salt and mango chutney and giving it all a really good mix. Add a few tablespoons of whole milk to loosen the mixture just a little.
- 6 Drizzle the dressing all over the top of the aubergine, saving the rest to serve on the side. Sprinkle with fried onions, raisins and coriander
